Biography Of Forster Henry Dubakeme

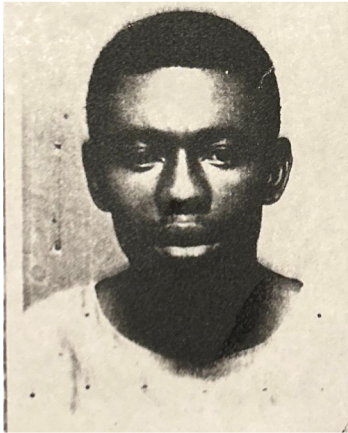
Forster Henry Dubakeme was an indigene of AMASSOMA in southern Ijaw Local Government Area of Bayelsa State. He was born into the family of Owupele Dubakeme of Ikoki-Ama Amassoma from the the Igonowari family.

He was born in Accra Ghana in the year 1950 and attended Ma-aba primary school and obtain his first school leaving certificate. Immediately after that he came back to Nigeria to meet his aunt Mrs. Mary Henry in the then eastern Nigeria in Owerri where he attended Trinity High School Oguta. Due to the civil war at that time in Nigeria, he came to Amassoma and stayed for a while before proceeding to Lagos. Subsequently when Port Harcourt was liberated, he came with his aunt Mrs. Mary Henry to Port Harcourt where he enrolled in Baptist High School Port Harcourt and obtains West African School Certificate with grade ii and was employed to work with the, then Ministry of Education from 1970 to 1973. It was in 1973 that he got the Rivers State Government scholarship to study abroad. (Dubakeme Family - Nigeria).

Dad, although it was a short time I had with you after years of absence. I was so grateful for reconciling after all this time. I was fortunate to be able to get to know you again and spend countless moments sharing past times, laughter, songs and learning about Nigeria. Even though it wasn't easy at times because of your illness, but im thankful and will treasure the memories that you gave. I will miss you, be at peace, rest in Paradise.
